



Cornerstone Iowa Health Update

2026 Legislative Session: Week One

Friday, January 16, 2026



We're highlighting the top news this week. Up first, the beginning of the Legislative Session, the Governor's Condition of the State, and the Governor's budget recommendations.

Week in Review

The Legislature convened Monday morning at 10:00AM for the second year of the 91st Iowa General Assembly. Republicans continue to hold the majority in both the Senate and House, and with a Republican as Governor, this is the tenth consecutive year of a Republican trifecta. The House consists of 67 Republicans and 33 Democrats. In the Senate, there are 33 Republicans and 17 Democrats.

Upon gaveling in, leadership in both chambers provided opening remarks and discussed their priorities for this legislative session. With various leadership changes since last session, this was one of the first public opportunities to see House Majority Leader Kaufmann, Senate Majority Leader Klimesh, and House Minority Leader Meyer address their caucuses about their priorities and how they plan to lead.

Speaker Grassley and Majority Leader Kaufmann both emphasized that the House Republican agenda for this session includes property taxes and eminent domain. Other priorities for these leaders are being tough on crime and increasing salaries for legislators. Majority Leader Klimesh said that Senate Republicans will focus on property tax reform, an eminent domain solution, and the economy.

On the Democratic side, House Minority Leader Meyer and Senate Minority Leader Weiner discussed public education, affordability, the economy, and the state budget as priorities.

Throughout the week, there were three major joint sessions for legislators to hear from the Governor, Judicial Branch, and National Guard. The Governor gave her annual Condition of the State on Tuesday evening. On Wednesday morning, Chief Justice Susan Christensen gave the annual Condition of the Judiciary. Lastly, on Thursday morning, Major General Stephen Osborn gave the annual Condition of the Guard.

Besides leadership's opening remarks and these joint sessions, much of the work at the capitol this week was procedural. The two new legislators elected through December special elections, Sen. **Renee Hardman** and Rep. **Wendy Larson**, were sworn in on Monday. Standing committees met throughout the week for largely organizational purposes, with committee chairs often sharing remarks about their hopes for the committee this year.

However, legislators also got off to a fast start moving legislation forward this week. By the end of the week, more than 250 bills had been introduced and nearly 20 bill subcommittees were held. Bills were introduced on two of this session's most anticipated issues, property taxes and eminent domain, with the eminent domain bill already passing through standing committee.

The Legislature is not in session on Monday in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, but legislative work will pick up in full force next week starting on Tuesday morning.

2026 Condition of the State

On Tuesday, Governor Reynolds delivered the annual Condition of the State message in front of the House and Senate. This was her ninth and final time making this address, as she is not running for reelection this year. In her speech, she highlighted her administration's accomplishments throughout her years as Governor, specifically in regards to reducing taxes, expanding educational freedom, and investing in healthcare.

During the speech, the Governor primarily focused her remarks and recommendations on property taxes, healthcare, nutrition, charter schools, public safety, government efficiency, Iowa farms, and veterans benefits. As was anticipated, the Governor introduced her plan for property tax reform during the speech. The bill, [SSB 3034](#) & [HSB 563](#), caps total revenue growth for all taxing authorities to 2%, changes property tax assessments from every two to every three years, allows for tax-deductible savings accounts for first time homebuyers, and freezes property taxes for older Iowans who own homes valued at under \$350,000.

In the healthcare realm, the Governor is recommending the following notable items:

- Allowing psychologists licensed in other states to practice in Iowa.
- Eliminating certificate of need (CON) requirements for outpatient behavioral health facilities.
- Expanding access to over-the-counter hormonal contraceptives.
- Requiring nutrition classes to be included in physicians' required continuing education.
- Allowing ivermectin to be sold over-the-counter.
- Allowing Iowa to apply for a federal waiver to create a state-based health insurance exchange.
- Prohibiting certain dyes and additives from school food programs.
- Requiring Iowa to apply for a federal waiver for Healthy SNAP and Healthy Summer EBT purchases.

In addition to these recommendations, the Governor also spoke about Healthy Hometowns, Iowa's federally-approved plan for utilizing Rural Health Transformation Program (RHTP) funding. She also focused on various Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) efforts to address Iowa's high cancer rates, including a partnership between HHS and the University of Iowa (UI) to conduct a comprehensive study of cancer in the state, the development of cancer care hubs, and an emphasis on early detection. More than \$50 million of Iowa's Rural Health Transformation Program Funding will be directed towards cancer prevention, screening, and treatment this year.

Governor's FY 2027 Budget Recommendations

In addition to delivering the Condition of the State on Tuesday, Governor Reynolds also unveiled her FY 2027 budget proposal. The 2027 fiscal year will begin on July 1, 2026, and run through June 30, 2027.

The Governor is recommending an increase to state General Fund spending of approximately \$180.0 million (1.9%), for a total of \$9.671 billion in FY 2027. As a reminder, the Revenue Estimating Conference estimated in December that FY 2027 revenue will equal approximately \$8.499 billion. However, the expenditure limitation for FY 2027 is \$9.878 billion, because it is affected by other factors, like surplus carryforward funding. This means the Governor's recommended budget is well within the limits of the expenditure limitation.

The Governor's recommended increases for FY 2027 primarily relate to education, healthcare, and property taxes. This includes increases of:

- \$73.9 million for State Foundation School Aid
- \$37.3 million for Medical Assistance
- \$21.8 million for Education Savings Accounts
- \$14.0 million for Education Support Personnel Salaries
- \$11.6 million for Homestead Tax Credit Aid
- \$8.1 million for Charter Schools
- \$6.6 million for HHS Community Access and Eligibility
- \$5.0 million for the Special Education Division

The Governor is also recommending a supplemental appropriation for FY 2026 of \$70.9 million for Medical Assistance to cover the expected Medicaid shortfall for this year.

On Tuesday, the House Health and Human Services Committee held presentations from the UI on its neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) and the Church Ambassador Network on foster care. The presentation on foster care included discussions on foster family recruitment and retention, social worker burnout, and the number of Iowa children in foster care.
